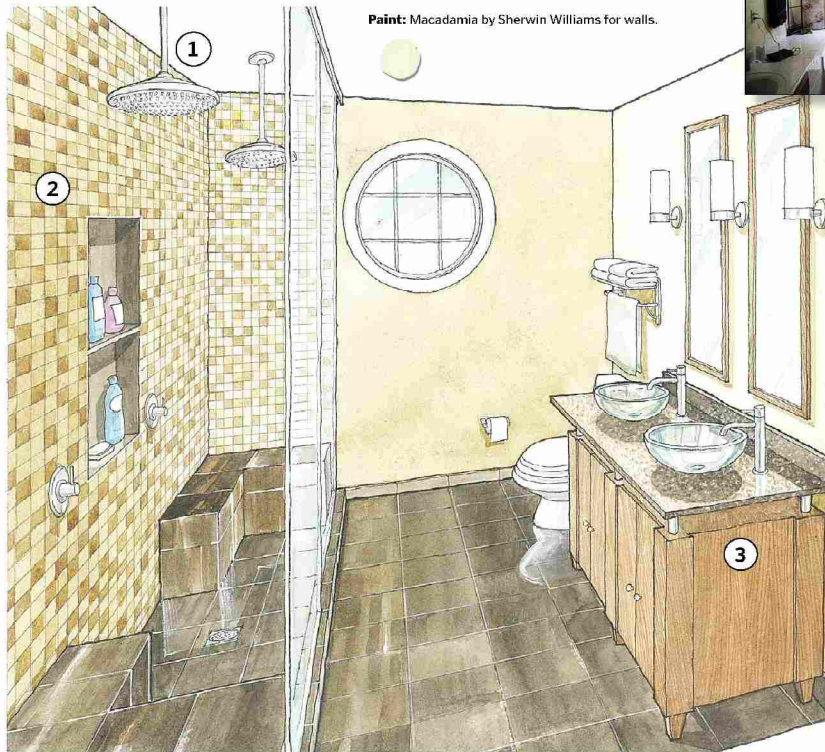
Suggestions

Remove the bathtub and create a custom shower that spans the length of one wall. This shower stall is built for two, with two shower heads and built-in benches. Live up a

practical bathroom with tiles. Metallic elements are embedded in the floor tiles, and the mosaic wall tiles include glass and slate. The tiles are in keeping with the room's palette of earth tones.

Cabinets underneath a double vanity help keep the room clutter-free. Contemporary double bathroom vanity (\$1,999, www.premiervanities.com). Hang two large mirrors framed in birch above the vanity, and flank each mirror with Albion single sconces in polished chrome (\$119 each, www.restorationhardware.com).



1 Expand the existing shower. Centurion showerheads with arm, ceiling mounted in chrome by Strom Plumbing (\$194 each, www.vintagetub.com). Albion balance-pressure shower valve and trim set in polished chrome (\$499 each, www.restorationhardware.com).



2 For shower walls, Sahara from Geologie's Mosaic Field collection by Oceanside Glasstile (\$38 per square, www.architecturalceramics.net). For floors, Corten A by TAU Ceramica (\$10 per square foot for 12-by-12 tiles, Frederick Tile, 301-662-4944).
